A Trip to Micanopy from Tuni and Jinny

Jinny Quackenbush organized a trip to Micanopy, FL. for members of the Classic Car Club in December, for those of you who aren't aware; Micanopy is the oldest continuously occupied inland settlement in the state of Florida. The Town of Micanopy (mick-ah-NO-pee) encompasses 1.03 square miles near the Alachua-Marion county line between Gainesville (home of the University of Florida) and Ocala in rural north-central Florida.

Cholokka Blvd. is Micanopy's main street, a designated historic district and the Town's primary tourist destination famous for its antique shops. Micanopy's authentic rustic storefronts lure casual shoppers, collectors, and seasonal scouts from all over the country. Our stay included the (established 1845) Herlong Mansion Historic Inn.

We traveled behind Jinny and Bob, they drove in the Cadillac Resto-Rod.





First stop upon arriving in Micanopy was to register and check into our rooms. Then off to lunch...First stop Roberto's Italian Eatery, although the restaurant wasn't normally open for lunch, the lovely soft spoken Jinny convinced them to open just for us. While waiting for the doors to open there was another old building on the property, Jim joined Bob and a few others to explore what treasures that might found inside...it housed old scooters, automotive, motorcycle parts and other good junk...of course, it was all FOR SALE. No purchases

around the property, each section had a different scene or theme. We crossed over a small bridge and wandered yet through another themed area. This was definitely well worth the ride out into the countryside.

Back at the mansion dinner was catered and served in a building called the "long room" We all retired to our rooms to meet at breakfast in the dining room. In the morning our travels would take us to Cross Creek State Park and the home of Marjorie Kinnan Rawlings, author of "The Yearling", "Cross Creek" and others.



Our docent was informative and very entertaining; he spoke of the history of Cross Creek as well as Rawlings personality and adventures. (A trip well worth the time). Of course lunch was calling us (no car trip is without many eating adventures!) lunch was arranged at the "Yearling" restaurant. I was very happy to see that the inside was so much nicer than what we saw on the outside...another well scheduled stop! Great food, especially if you have a little adventurer in you...the menu included things like venison, soft shell crab, quail, escargot, etc...I had the sampler that included frogs legs, alligator, green tomatoes etc. but you could have a good old burger and onion rings if you chose.





Our leisurely drive back to the mansion gave us time to relax and meet again for wine and cookies in the afternoon, then of course get dressed in our Holiday Finest for our catered Christmas dinner. Our entertainment included each of us drawing a number and joining with others in a group to sing holiday songs (some of which we actually knew the words to), no windows broken this time...our evening also included a gift exchange, some of us retired into our rooms while others continued our camaraderie in the living room of the mansion.

Breakfast in the morning gave us an opportunity to decide what we wanted to see and do. We opted to visit the

oldest constantly running Post Office in Evinston, Florida, which was truly a step back in time. You could buy your fresh veggies, meats and canned goods whilst you were in there to pick up your mail from you postal box.





I had a craving for some of those homemade pickles, but we had more travels to make today. Back into our cars we made the trip to visit and view Payne's Prairie. Florida's first state preserve and is now designated as a National Natural Landmark. Noted artist and naturalist William Bartram called it the great Alachua Savannah. During the 1800's, steamboats were a frequent sight on what was called Alachua Lake. American Alligators and small herds of Florida Cracker Horses and Florida Cracker cattle, first herded by the

Seminole can be seen if you venture into the Park. The Plains Bison were reintroduced to the park from Oklahoma in the mid 1970s, as part of the park service goal of restoring Florida's natural resources to pre-European settler conditions. We parked our cars and ventured out onto a walkway off highway 441, to view this spectacular site.
