A Personal History—Peter Starr

Jinny asked me to write a piece for our club newsletter, and said it could be about anything personal or car related. So, I thought I'd make it both and write about how I came to the hobby and what my favorite cars are.

At the age of 7 my Dad brought home a 1957 Ford Skyliner "demonstrator" from the Ford dealer he worked at. Seeing that mechanical hard top go down and turn into a convertible had a lasting effect on me. I was hooked!

Then in 1959, when he had his own Pontiac-Buick agency, my Mom and one of my brothers and I took a 600 mile trip during the summer in a brand new top-of-the-line '59 Bonneville Convertible. I'll never forget the light green mist color of that car, along with the tricolor green 'morokide' interior! I keep looking to this day to find the twin to that car, and still hope to own one someday.



When I was old enough to drive I bought a '56 Oldsmobile Holiday "88" 4 door hardtop. It had the 4 speed Automatic Transmission with 2 speeds in low gear, and was very fast for its day particularly off the line. I've subsequently owned 3 more same-year Oldsmobiles, and currently have the red and white Super 88 convertible that my wife Gina and I drove in the Vintage Rally's Northwest Passage 5 day tour in 2010. It has been here with me in St Augustine the last two years.

In 1969 my Dad and older brother opened a Toyota agency in our hometown in Massachusetts. This was back in the day when people didn't know what a Toyota was, and would come in asking "What kind of toys do you sell?"!!

I found myself totally intrigued by the 2 liter, six cylinder, twin cam two door sports coupe that Toyota featured on the cover of their full-line product brochure called the 2000GT. This was a hand-built, high performance luxury sports car selling for \$7600 at a time when a new Corolla was base priced at \$1,280 and a Corona 4 Door Sedan sold for \$1700!



Because Toyota only brought 62 of these cars into America between 1967 and 1970, we never did get one into our store. Not only that, most of them went to California, where Toyota was much more popular at the time than in the East. So it was not until 1976 that I actually got to see one "in the flesh" at the Watkins Glen Formula One races that Toyota sponsored that year. A dealer from Long Island brought his personal car to the track and did the parade lap with it prior to the start of the race.

Talk about love at first sight! The car was absolutely exquisite!! Compound curves throughout its hand-made steel body, with nary a straight piece of glass; 3'9" tall, with a superelegant interior with genuine rosewood dash and mahogany steering wheel and shift knob; the car just captivated me! I now had the "gotta-haves"!!



Shortly thereafter, I located the car that I still own which was in Duluth, MN. I flew out

with a dealer plate and multiple cashier's checks equaling the seller's asking price and drove the car back to New Hampshire. This was in 1977 when the movie Star Wars was popular, and my business partner and I coined the expressions "90-110mph is light speed, and you make the jump into hyper-space over 110!" All I'll say about that is the car comes into its own once you get into 'hyper-space'!

Since 1976 we've owned or restored over 50 examples of this car, and we currently have in our collection the very first 2000GT that Toyota built (Serial # MF10-10001). We performed a body-off restoration of this car back to its original track condition, just as it was when it was campaigned by Carroll Shelby in 1968 SCCA manufacturer's championship "C" production. Since its restoration, we have had the car to several vintage events, including the Goodwood Festival of Speed in England in 2004 and the Laguna Seca Historic races in Monterey, CA in 2007. Most recently this past September it raced at Lime Rock Park in Connecticut.

In 2004, after spending 35 years primarily as a Toyota dealer I segued from a vocation in the car business to an avocation, and now maintain a collection of about 20 antique automobiles along with my long-time partner. These are made up mostly of cars from the 1950's and 1960's, and are split about equally between domestic and import-sports.
